1. 4610 Custis Avenue



Acer truncatum, Shantung Maple

Plant Family: Sapindaceae
(Soapberry family)
Native Habitat: Deciduous
oak forests in China

This fast-growing tree has shiny light green foliage in summer, and yellow flower clusters in the early spring. It is very hardy and adaptable.

2. 2251 22nd Street



Acer buergerianum, Trident Maple

Plant Family: Sapindaceae
(Soapberry family)
Native Habitat:
China and Japan

Trident Maple has interesting flaky bark and 3-pointed leaves. It tolerates most soils with light to moderate moisture, grows quickly, and is quite dependable once established.

3. 2212 22nd Avenue



Magnolia × soulangeana, Saucer Magnolia

Plant Family: Magnoliaceae
(Magnolia family)
Native Habitat: France

Saucer Magnolia is a popular flowering accent tree, usually as a multi-trunk or low-branching specimen for gardens or lawns. It requires loose, fertile soil and moderate moisture, where it flowers best in full sun. Many named varieties are available with different flower colors.

4. 2153 22nd Avenue



Arbutus unedo, Strawberry Tree

Plant Family: Ericaceae
(Heather Family)
Native Habitat: Southern
Europe, Ireland, scrub and
rocky hillsides

Strawberry Tree is an attractive evergreen shade tree, with shiny dark green color, red bark, and multi-trunk branching habit. The bell-shaped flowers and red fruit add to its visual interest in winter and early spring. Once established, it is a very durable tree.

Other uses: edible fruits; the leaves, bark and root are astringent and diuretic; high in tannins

5. 4701 Joaquin Way, Leonardo DaVinci School
Established tree removed and replaced with
Trident Maples, Japanese Maple, and Zelkovas.

6. 4713 Joaquin Way



Acer rubrum, Red Maple

Plant Family: Sapindaceae
(Soapberry family)
Native Habitat: Eastern
North America, usually
swamps and uplands, also
can grow on dry hillsides

The Red Maple is fast growing and a heavy water user. It has red twigs, buds, and red winged seeds in the spring. The fall color may vary from yellow to red except on named cultivars, like “Red Sunset” and “October Glory”. It is very popular as a street tree.

Other uses: attracts birds; wetland plant; sap contains sugar (yielding about half the quantity obtained from the sugar maple).



Cercis canadensis, Eastern Redbud

Plant Family: Fabaceae,
(Pea Family)
Native Habitat: Eastern
North America - rich
woods, ravines and
borders of streams - It
often forms a distinct
understory in woodlands

Eastern Redbud is a commonly used single or multi-trunk tree, effective as a flowering or foliage accent. It blooms best in full sun, where it receives moderate moisture. Prone to red humped caterpillar and tent caterpillar attacks.

8. Shielah Way



Platanus racemosa, CA Sycamore
Plant Family: Platanaceae (Plane tree family)
Native Habitat: California! Often interbreeds with *Platanus orientalis*, which is native to S.E. Europe and W. Asia

A very fast growing native riparian tree. It tolerates extreme heat and wind, drought, atmospheric pollution, and compacted soils.

8. 4952 Virginia Way



Pistacia chinensis, Chinese Pistache
Plant Family: Anacardiaceae (Cashew family)
Native Habitat: Forests on stone hills in western China

A beautiful street tree with a wide canopy, fall color, and fragrant leaves. Grows best with good drainage. Trees are male or female – the females have colorful berries, which birds love.

9. 5211 Salvator Way



Nyssa sylvatica, Tupelo
Plant Family: Nyssaceae (Sourgum Family)
Native Habitat: Eastern North America, low acid woods, swamps, shores in imperfectly drained soils

The Tupelo is a deciduous tree with reliably bright fall color. It tolerates poor drainage and low soil oxygen found in compacted urban soil. They prefer alkaline soils and leaf in late Spring.

Other uses: Attracts birds and butterflies!

10. 2235 Hooke Way



Quercus lobata Heritage Valley Oak
Plant Family: Fagaceae (Beech Family)
Native Habitat: Fertile lowlands

in deep rich soils in the valleys of W. California between the Sierra Nevada and the coast.

This majestic tree is the largest oak in North America. Trunk and limbs of mature trees are picturesquely twisted with long, drooping outer branches. Low water user and very adaptable.

Other uses: acorns lower in tannins than other species – was a staple food for several native North American tribes – can be dried and used in stews or breads (tannins leached out by thoroughly rinsing or boiling the seed in water).

11. 4640 23rd Street



Acer palmatum, Japanese Maple
Plant Family: Sapindaceae (Soapberry family)
Native Habitat: Japan and Korea, woods and thickets in lowlands and mountains

Japanese Maple is a commonly used accent tree in lawns or moderately moist settings, beneath an over-story of taller shade trees. It prefers a shady spot with moist, well-drained loam and plenty of added humus.
